Moving Past Your Personal Failures

⁸ The LORD is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. ⁹ He will not always accuse, nor will he keep his anger forever. ¹⁰ He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities. ¹¹ For as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is his steadfast love toward those who fear him; ¹² as far as the east is from the west, so far he removes our transgressions from us. *-Psalm 103:8-12*

For so many of us it's really difficult to move past our own past. We may know that God has forgiven us, but we have a

difficult time forgiving ourselves. Many people feel the burden that King David felt when he said this in Psalm 38:4: "My guilt has overwhelmed me like a burden that is too heavy to bear." Guilt and shame and sin is a burden that is too heavy to bear. When we don't ask for God's forgiveness and seek to be reconciled to God through repentance, then we carry around the guilt and the weight of our sins. There are all kinds of sins in our lives. Some of them seem small, and some of them seem huge. We carry them around with us in our souls. We carry them so long as we don't confess them. Some of them become quite heavy.

Every day there's a host of small things that fit in this category, and then every so often, there is something so significant, you know that if it really became known, you could lose your family or your job. Many times, we don't repent of these things. We don't come to God and ask for healing and deliverance. We just carry them with us. So long as you keep carrying these things and adding to them every day, you find that the burden becomes overwhelming. You can carry them, but when you keep adding to that burden of sin it begins to bend you over. You can't run anymore. You lose your joy. You find yourself feeling like the Psalmist. "My guilt has overwhelmed me like a burden that is too heavy to bear." We keep carrying it and adding to it until we repent and come before God. The gulf becomes wider. God becomes more distant. That burden begins to limit your future.

God desires to take the initiative and heal what is broken. Jesus says, "Let me take that from you. Let me lift the burden from you." You find in the Old Testament that God provided a whole system by which people could atone for their sins because God wanted them to be healed. God wanted them to live in right relationship with Him. The Christian faith, more than any other world religion, is a faith about grace and redemption and healing and forgiveness and mercy. This is what God does, and this is what the scripture teaches us.

On Sunday we are going to conclude our *Moving Past Your Past* sermon series by talking about three ways to move past your failures. I hope you will invite someone you know to come with you and join us for worship at 8:30 or 10:50 a.m. Have a great week.

More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of. Wherefore, let thy voice rise like a fountain for me night and day. For what are men better than sheep or goats that nourish a blind life within the brain, if, knowing God, they lift not hands of prayer both for themselves and those who call them friend?" Teacher: Dr. Jerry Perryman.
